


Importance of Privacy

- Cyber criminals love finding sensitive data such as credit card numbers, social security numbers, addresses, etc!



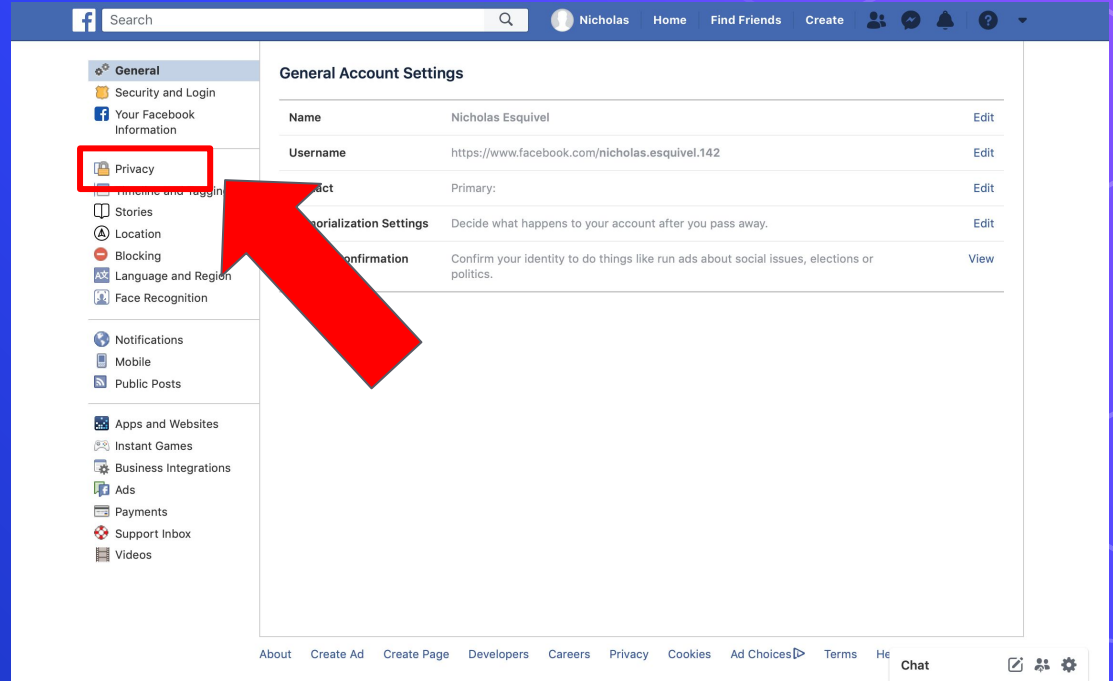
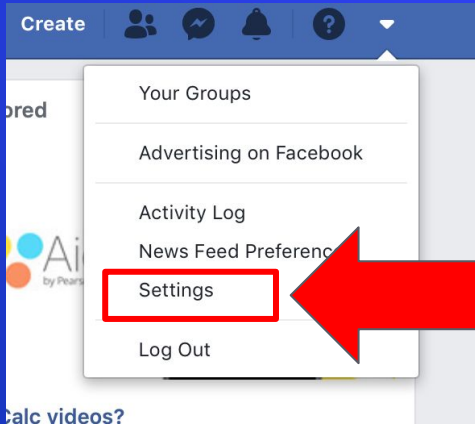

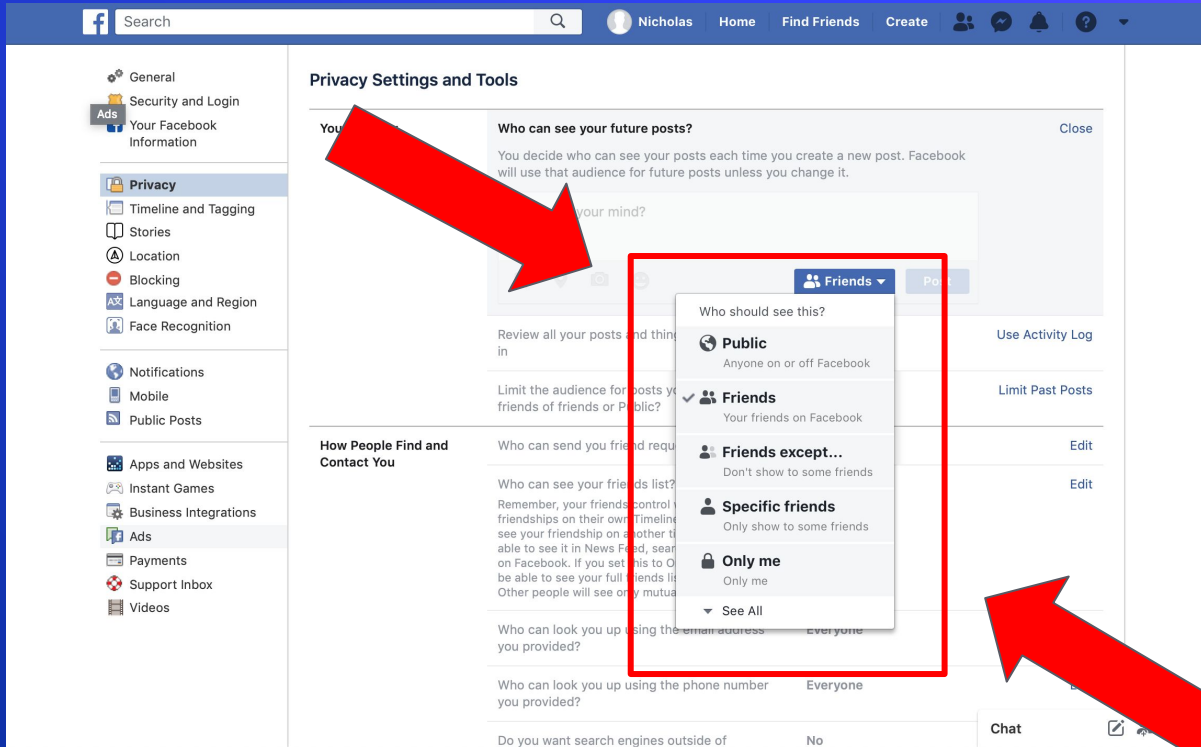

- Do not share any sensitive information about yourself including your credit card numbers, birthday, address, phone number, etc.



Basic Practices to Follow

- Create a strong password

WEAK PASSWORD

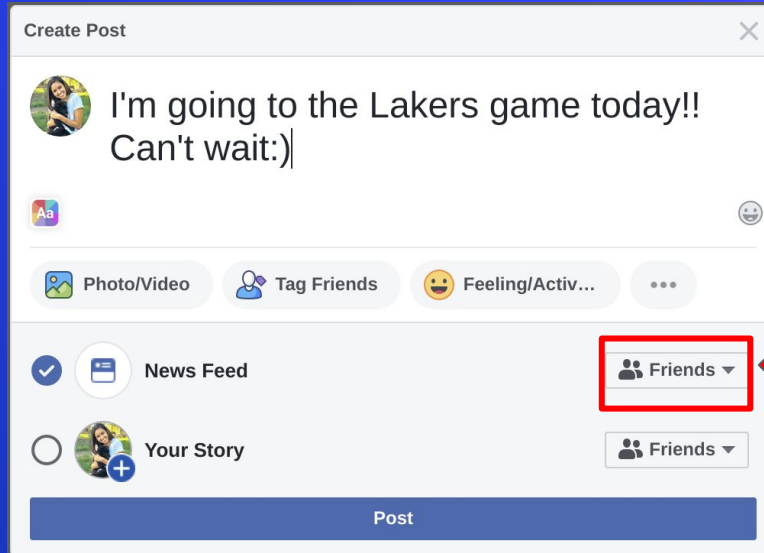
- NO PASSWORD AT ALL.
- CONTAINS YOUR USER NAME, REAL NAME, OR COMPANY NAME.
- PASSWORDS THAT INCREMENT (PASSWORD1, PASSWORD2, PASSWORD3 ...) ARE NOT STRONG.
- CONTAINS A COMPLETE DICTIONARY WORD. FOR EXAMPLE, PASSWORD IS A WEAK PASSWORD.

STRONG PASSWORD

- AT LEAST SEVEN CHARACTERS LONG.
- DOES NOT CONTAIN YOUR USER NAME, REAL NAME, OR COMPANY NAME.
- IS SIGNIFICANTLY DIFFERENT FROM PREVIOUS PASSWORDS
- CONTAINS CHARACTERS FROM EACH OF THE FOLLOWING – UPPER-CASE LETTERS, LOWER-CASE LETTERS, NUMERALS.

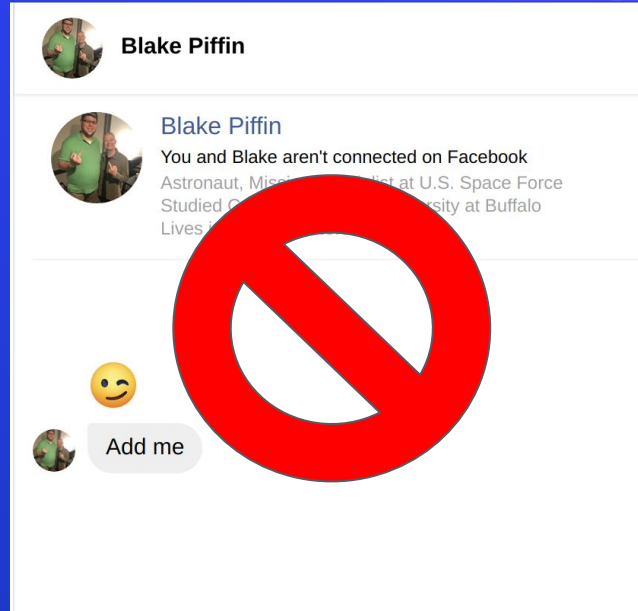

- Only share information with your family and friends

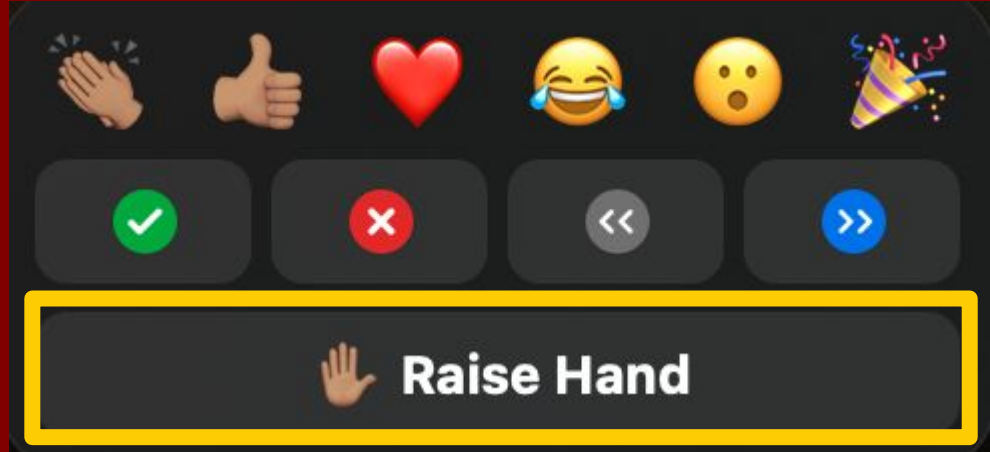
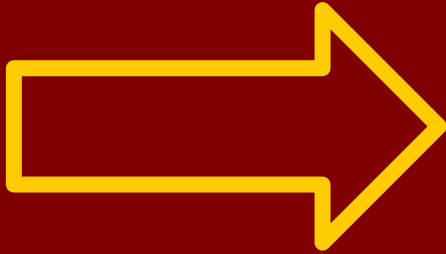
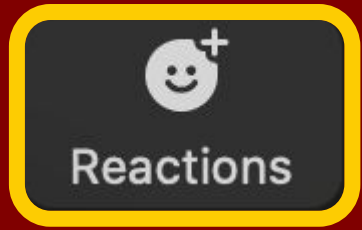
